## The SAR Community Reflects on September 11th

On Monday, September 12<sup>th</sup>, SAR Academy commemorated the anniversary of 9/11 in an outdoor ceremony. Rabbi Krauss gave a D'var Torah about the week's parsha, Ki Tavo, about dark moments in our history. Rabbi Krauss explained the importance of remembering 9/11, but also understanding that life goes on. NYPD Retired Lieutenant David Bohem, who was assigned to the Manhattan South Borough Crime Unit and spent two months in the recovery efforts at Ground Zero also spoke about his experiences.

Members of the Riverdale Hatzalah joined the ceremony, and our students had the chance to express "hakarot ha'tov" to our own first responders. Jamie Lassner, a Manhattan Hatzolah first responder, spoke with middle school students and answered questions about his experience.

The 7<sup>th</sup> grade, led by teacher Elayna Koevary, constructed a mini-exhibition based on the Ground Zero exhibit "Tiles for America." Students interviewed their parents about their personal accounts of September 11th. They shared their stories,

and designed a commemorative tile for the showcase. The exhibit was on display throughout the week.

The High School gathered for a morning assembly to mark this tragic date. The commemoration opened with an address by William Cooper, President of Student Government. Dr. Rivka Schwartz then spoke about how this tenth anniversary found us poised between memory and history, with the adults in the building having visceral and immediate memories of the day, while most students, who were only between four and eight years old on in 2001, had learned about it later as a historical event.

Rabbi Tully Harcsztark spoke to students and faculty about the educational value of commemorating September 11<sup>th</sup> and instilling a sense of experience in students who didn't witness the day firsthand. The event concluded with the recitation by Rabbi Shmuel Hain, Rosh Beit Midrash of SAR High School, of a special Kel Malei Rachamim memorial prayer for the victims.

## GILAD SHALIT TEFILA

**October 5<sup>th</sup>:** Thousands of students gathered in their respective schools worldwide united by one cause: to pray for the safe return of Gilad Shalit. The global event was led by Rabbi Joel Cohn, former SAR Principal, and was broadcast live from The Shalit Family's tent in Jerusalem to over 75 schools. Together with the Shalit family, SAR marked Gilad's abduction over five years earlier. The ceremony began with an introduction by Rabbi Cohn followed by *tefilot*, speeches, and *tehilim*.

At SAR, Rabbi Harcsztark recited *Tehilim*, Chapter 20, "*Lam'Natzeiach Mizmor L'David.*" He was joined by the entire SAR High School student body and faculty and SAR Academy junior high school students.

Nobel Laureate Dr. Elie Wiesel spoke and defined prayer as "simple words with divine meaning." Rabbi Jonathan Rosenblatt of the RJC also spoke about *tefilah*. He expressed that prayer encompasses one simple miracle - the miracle of existence.

With enough strength and love worldwide, students hoped that their prayers would be answered and Gilad would know he was not alone. United in prayer, *Am Echad, B'Lev Echad*, they declared, "let's bring Gilad home." Little did they know that their prayers would be answered just weeks later.

## GILAD SHALIT IS FREE!

**October 18<sup>th</sup>:** *Chol HaMoed Sukkot* in the SAR gym buzzed with anticipation. The excitement mounted as Grades 1 through 8 entered the room. A montage of images from Gilad Shalit's release projected on the screen: Gilad with Egyptian authorities, Gilad with Prime Minister Netanyahu, and finally - Gilad with his father. After 1,941 days in captivity, Gilad was free!

It was only three weeks prior that the students joined together with *Tefillot* for Gilad, to pray for his safe and speedy return. For many, the contrast of the two events was emotional and surreal.

Led by Rabbi Rosenberg, the students recited two *Tehilim* to thank *Hashem* for the amazing day, remember victims of terror, and pray for the safety of Israel. Rabbi Krauss, who was in Israel for a family simcha, addressed the students in a video. He told the students that all of Israel had dropped everything they were doing to watch the news. He encouraged the students to continue the celebration and to remember, "כל ישראל ערבים זה בזה", we are all responsible for each other and that we should continue to pray for ישראל עם.

The students sang "ושבו בנים לגבולם" and *Hatikva*. Third grade student Devorah Cohen was moved by this extraordinary event. "I've been to Israel many times, and my dad is Israeli. I've seen many posters of Gilad Shalit near the government and President's home. When I walked by, I wanted to cry. I hope that since the Jewish people did the *mitzvah* of releasing Gilad Shalit, *Hashem* will keep Israel safe from terror."

The SAR family is so happy that Gilad is home!



## Enrichment Clusters

This Fall, SAR Academy launched a weekly enrichment program for grades 2 through 4. This broad initiative reflects our deep commitment to enabling each student to discover and take pride in the unique talents with which she or he is endowed.

Our Enrichment Program allows children to explore an area of interest in a small, multi-age group led by a facilitator. These groups, called Enrichment Clusters, are organized around major disciplines or cross-disciplinary topics. They are built on inquiry, advanced content, and methodology, which allow students to secure and then apply new skills to real-world issues that are personally meaningful.

Many clusters have hosted visiting speakers who are professionals in related fields. These speakers act as role models for what is possible as a problem solver in the "real world." Movie producer Nancy Spielberg joined our Video Production Company cluster, Blu Greenberg was a visiting author to the Photographs & Memories: Online Publishing Company cluster, and Toby Kahn, renowned artist, met with students in art-related clusters.

Our varied enrichment offerings such as: *Lights! Camera! Action! Video Production Company, International Culinary Arts Institute, Whodunit? Mysteries, Clues, & Forensics, Mindbenders: Riddles, Puzzles, & Lateral Thinking Consortium, Graphic Design Institute, Service Dog Society, Wizards of Wall Street, Write/Click Photojournalism Group, and Motors & Mechanics: Making Things Go*, address the diverse abilities and strengths our students possess.

Our ultimate goal is to help children explore their interests, develop their talents, and understand how they can share their gifts with the world.

The junior high school area was a sea of pink. The 7th and 8th grades marked Breast Cancer Awareness Month with a special program. Seventh graders Rebecca Hyman and Liana Katz, who proposed the event, created a video featuring interviews of SAR students and teachers who have been affected by breast cancer. Those interviewed discussed how breast cancer had touched their lives and had made them more aware of the blessings of good health, friends, and community.



Students listened intently as Rabbi Krauss linked the event with the school-wide theme of Arvut, and then enjoyed delicious pink-frosted cupcakes. Individual sponsors donated the cupcakes that were sold throughout the building to raise money for Sharsheret.

Pink Day was also in full swing at SAR High School. The Health Club, led by Seniors Gabriela Attias, Ariella Spievack, and Miryam Steinmetz-Silber, organized the day, and sold pins, jewelry, and snacks during lunch and mincha break. They raised over \$600, which will benefit the Susan G. Komen Passionately Pink for the Cure Foundation.

## Summer Science Experiences at SAR High School

Nearly 40 high school students participated in advanced science experiences this summer. Several conducted research and completed internships in laboratories and hospitals throughout the New York Metropolitan area and Israel. Here are some observations:

- **Olivia Devillers, Columbia University Hospital:** *"I have been learning how to do the Western Blot from start to finish. They have let me run my own gels and do the entire process by myself just for practice."*
- **Yosef Frenkel, Memorial Sloan Kettering:** *"I'm learning a programming language, Matlab, which is used for scientific research across the country."*
- **Leore Lavin, Mount Sinai Medical Center:** *"It's amazing how much I understand from taking AP Biology. One of the scientists working on gene assays was really impressed that I knew what siRNAs were!"*

Several students participated in our own Biology Challenge option. Seven students attended a program at the Museum of Natural History, where they studied anthropology, astronomy, geology, biodiversity, and genetics.

Two students studied engineering at Columbia University and University of Pennsylvania. **Eyal Foni**, who studied nanotechnology at University of Pennsylvania, won second prize in a team contest for research on the nanotechnology of gecko feet.

Seven 9<sup>th</sup> graders took a course on DNA technologies at the Cold Spring Harbor Dolan DNA Learning Center.

These experiential learning opportunities and scientific achievements are great examples that SAR high school students are curious, motivated, and enthusiastic about making discoveries.

## BUILDING BRIDGES PROGRAM

SAR High School has partnered with two Bronx high schools, University Heights High School, a public school, and Fieldston, a private school, to form Building Bridges, a new program for juniors and seniors. The goals of Building Bridges are to break down stereotypes, find common ground, and create a new diverse community. Throughout the Fall semester, students will visit each school to learn about the values and culture of each institution. Next semester, the students will plan social and volunteer activities that will strengthen their own relationships and contribute to the community.
