Authors from Jean Jacques Rousseau to Yuval Noah Harari have insisted that the rise of civilization was the beginning of mankind's misfortune. Nonetheless, few of us would opt to live at any other time than the present. Is civilization a blessing or a curse? We will look at its origins in Mesopotamia, where social hierarchy and specialization opened up new horizons for human endeavor. From there, we will move to the flowering of religious creativity during the Axial Age. We will then explore Hellenistic contributions to philosophy and culture, and we will end by considering Rome's approach to governance and its legacy in the development of the West.

Metacognition: What We Think About Thinking

Cognition is the branch of psychology concerned with mental processes. In each of the three sessions, we will explore a higher order brain process. In the first class, we will consider memory and how the brain receives, processes and stores information. In the second class, we will turn our attention to thinking, problem solving and decision making, and analyze common thought blunders. In the third class, we will examine language and ask the age-old, chicken and egg question of which comes first - words or thoughts? Thinking about and challenging our own thinking is at the heart of many different types of therapies. We will consider ways in which metacognition is being used to help people lead more fulfilled lives.

Parables, Literature and History: Understanding Famous Talmudic Stories

In this series, we will explore Talmudic stories through both traditional and academic lenses in search of their eternal meaning. Each class will focus on a new story, allowing us to develop an approach to unlocking the values contained therein. Examples of stories we will study are the classic conflict between Rabbi Elazar and the rabbis surrounding the "Tanur Shel Achnai," and Rabbi Shimon Bar Yochai's flight from society and reemergence into Judaism. We will pay attention to how the rabbis used both literary techniques and biblical allusions to craft everlasting treasures of our tradition.

Intentional Ambiguity in Chumash: The Characters We Think We Know

We are often taught to look at biblical characters as either heroes or villains. Through an in-depth study of pshat and the commentaries of Rashbam and Ramban, we will consider famous biblical characters such as Cain, Yishmael, Yosef and Moshe in a new light. What motivated their actions? How does the Torah want us to understand their legacy? Is it possible to view Cain's actions in a positive light and to consider Yishmael a brilliant businessman? By studying individual characters, we will develop an understanding of how and why the Torah is intentionally ambiguous in its portrayal of personality.
